Obituary

Hazel Compton was born in Charlottesville, VA, to the union of Mariah Turner and John Compton, on October 19, 1914. She had two older brothers, Johnson and Tim, as well as an older sister, Dora Mansfield, by her mother’s first marriage. She also had a sister, Ardelia Compton Hagler and a brother Thomas Hughes, by her father’s second marriage.

Her mother, Mariah, passed away when Hazel was about six years old. Her brothers stayed in Charlottesville, but Hazel moved to Washington, DC, to be raised by her sister Dora and her husband, William Johnson. She lived as a “sister” to Dora and William’s children, Goldie, Dollace, Donald, Sylvia (who died as a baby) and Jual, as well as William’s niece, Naomi.

As a teenager, Hazel’s talent for teaching began to evolve as she took an interest in the activities of the children of the neighborhood. She was an ardent student throughout her school years and was a top student at the prestigious Dunbar High School in Washington, DC. Upon graduation, she matriculated at DC Teachers College to train as an elementary schoolteacher. After graduation, she moved to North Carolina to teach. She returned to DC, married briefly, and worked at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing.

Upon the death of her sister, Dora, in 1943, Hazel moved to Cleveland, OH. In addition to teaching for the Cleveland Public School System (retiring in 1971), she was very active socially. She traveled abroad with friends, visiting many countries, as well as joined the Karamu Dancers of Cleveland, due to her love of dancing. She later married Richard Mills and was indoctrinated into Alpha Wives in October, 1952. Hazel found a home at the Mt. Zion Congregational Church and remained a member until her death.

Hazel took up residence at the Eliza Bryant Village for senior citizens in 1977, and remained there as their longest living resident. The sun set on her life at 4:05 p.m. on December 31, 2012, at the ripe age of 98 years, having been predeceased by all of her siblings. She is survived by her nieces: Dollace Gordon, Detroit, MI; Goldie Brown, Washington DC; Ardelia Wilson (Teddy), Cleveland, OH; Patricia Hagler-Tucker (Columbus), Cleveland, OH; three special friends, Ophelia Parrom, Joanne McLendon, and Deacon George Ellis, Jr. as well as a host of great nieces, great nephews, and other relatives and friends.
